

Living in Love & Faith

Last year, you may remember, the Church of England nationally asked its members, both individually but also corporately within parishes, Deaneries and Dioceses, to engage in the Living in Love and Faith (LLF) process. It also set a deadline of it being completed before Christmas which many people believed to be completely

unrealistic. That deadline was eventually pushed back and so were will now be engaging in LLF at St. Wilfrid's beginning in March this year.

LLF asks how do questions about identity, sexuality, relationships and marriage fit within the bigger picture of the good news of Jesus Christ? What does it mean to live in love and faith together as a Church?

The Church of England is keenly aware that issues of gender and sexuality are intrinsic to people's experience; their sense of identity; their lives and the loving relationships that shape and sustain them. We also know that the life and mission of our Church – and of the worldwide Anglican Communion – are affected by the deep, and sometimes painful, disagreements among us which have been debated and discussed on many occasions over the years.

There will be two LLF courses available to you. There will be a daytime course which will be conducted entirely on Zoom. This group invites people from across the whole Deanery to participate and will be each afternoon from 2.00 p.m. The second group is for local church members and will be in person. This group will meet each Thursday evening at 7.45 p.m. at The Beacon. These are not the kinds of group you can dip in and out of and we ask those participating to please make a commitment to one group and stick with it.

We believe that the Holy Spirit will be active among us as we pray, study and deliberate together to discover Christ's call to the Church today. We do this with a deep sense of hopefulness for a future in which Christians can follow Christ together joyfully, fruitfully and with integrity.

Dear Friends,

One of the most critical, but often overlooked, events in the Old Testament is the 50 year period, from around 586-539 BC, during which the people of Israel (by which we really mean the political and religious leaders) were taken into exile in Babylon. You may remember those poignant words from Psalm 137 (which we can barely read without hearing Boney M), "By the rivers of Babylon - there we sat down and there we wept when we remembered Zion".

At the end of that period, when Babylon itself was overthrown by the Persian King Cyrus, the Israelites were permitted to return to the land of Israel, to re-establish Jerusalem as a city and to rebuild the Temple. The story of how this happened can be found in the biblical books of 2 Kings, Nehemiah and Ezra. Following the restoration there was a great deal of soul searching as the people of Israel came to terms with what had happened to them but also, of course, a great deal of looking forward.

I feel that we have gone through a period of exile over the last two years. We can only reflect on the opportunities that we have missed to join in worship, to meet socially, to pay our respects to those who have died, to comfort family and friends in their grief and sorrow or share in their joys and celebrations. There is much in these things that need working through as we come, hopefully, towards the end of this pandemic. The noises coming from the Government suggest that by the end of March the requirement to isolate if you have Covid will come to an end which suggests also that most, if not all, other restrictions will also be done away with.

This now means, however, that we need to look forward and think about opportunities as well as problems. One of the dangers is that we simply slip back into doing the same old same old whereas perhaps Covid has pressed a reset button, where we have the opportunity to look at things anew, and ask ourselves some difficult questions in the process.

As you will know, due to Omicron we had to postpone the new projects were hoping to start down at The Beacon and we are now looking to start these in May. There will be more about this is the next magazine, but please consider helping out, giving an hour or two once a week or once a month to serve our community and to build up the fellowship of the Church.

Covid Update

There was a very clear sense of optimism as we edged through autumn that we might have put the worst of this pandemic behind us and could look forward to a more 'normal' Christmas. Unfortunately, the Omicron variant of the Covid virus put paid to that. Masks were reintroduced and there was a palpable tension surrounding this more easily transmissible version, especially earlier on in the winter when it wasn't known how serious the effects of it were going to be.

That anxiety was clearly revealed in our church numbers over Christmas which were considerably down on 2019, and by considerably down I mean congregation numbers at the main Christmas services were at best half what they were, at worst as little as a third of what they had been.

This new wave of infection has led us to moving most of our church meetings back onto Zoom and, as you know, has led us to postpone the new projects were looking forward to starting at The Beacon this year.

Currently I think we are in something of a hiatus. The early signs in January seem to indicate that we are past the crest of this latest wave of infections with both infection rates (locally down 48%) and hospitalisations (down 8.3%) on the decline and the Government doesn't seem anxious to tighten the current restrictions. The downside however is that there has been no indication that they are looking to reduce them either so, as I say, a state of limbo.


One critical aspect of this pandemic is the impact it is having on church finances. As you might imagine, Christmas normally provides an important boost to our income, but with numbers so greatly reduced this has had a big impact. As you will know the PCC has a cash reserve from the sale of Mode Cottage 7 years ago. The income from the sale was judiciously invested until we reached

the point that we were able to purchase The Beacon effectively from the interest income we had received over those years. Unfortunately, due to the pandemic we have had to convert more of our investments into yield bearing to provide cash to get us through this crisis. So far we have not had to touch any of the capital, and we don't expect to have to, but it will mean



that we will not get anywhere near the same capital growth going forward.

The upshot is that we really need our regular members to consider their giving to the church. We encourage you to increase the amount you give if you can, to give regularly by setting up a Standing Order, and to give Tax efficiently by Gift Aiding your donation where appropriate.

PCC Report

At the January meeting the PCC -

- ◆ Received a letter from Chester Cathedral regarding the Cathedrals new doors for which it requires an image representing each church in the Diocese.
- ◆ Formally approved the change in Covid guidance that, in line with Government guidance, from the 27th January it would no longer be mandatory to wear a face covering in church.
- ◆ Received the report from the Faith & Worship subgroup. It was noted that congregation numbers over Christmas were well down on where they were in 2019. It was also reported that plans were being developed to celebrate the Queen's Platinum Jubilee at the start of June.
- ◆ Received a report from the Events subgroup. There are a number of events planned this year including three concerts, three Parish Lunches, an Easter Egg hunt and a Strawberry Tea, alongside the usual Harvest Supper and Church Fair.
- ◆ Received the Finance Report. The effects of church closure and restrictions due to Covid were clear to see in the accounts with our annual income down to £85000 (against a Parish Share alone of £81000). It was agreed that we continue to pay half our Parish Share monthly, with the expectation of paying the remainder at the end of the year.
- ◆ Our Parish Safeguarding Officer spoke of the need for our Messy Church helpers to undergo basic online Safeguarding Training and that steps had been taken to ensure all our helpers were DBS checked. An updated set of Safeguarding guidelines have been produced and were distributed to Messy Church leaders.
- ◆ Received a report regarding The Beacon which has now been furnished with attractive storage units which also have the affect of cutting down noise.
