

Dear Friends,

As I write this piece countries around the world are marking the 1st anniversary of the Russian invasion of the Ukraine. What has stood out for me in the reviews of the last year has been how often people, knowledgeable and intelligent people, got things so wrong. In the weeks before the invasion commentators and politicians, including the Ukrainian President Volodymyr Zelenskyy, were lining up to say there was no way Russia would invade. When the Russian did invade there was a wide-spread belief that it would all be over in a matter of weeks, if not days. The Russians had, according to some accounts, even prepared a victory parade through Kiev. These predictions remind me of the oil well fires in Kuwait which experts predicted would take 2-3 years to extinguish when it was all done in 10 months.

As we continue our slow pilgrimage through Lent these events remind me of the words of Psalm 146, "Do not put your trust in princes, in mortals, in whom there is no help" which has a similar flavour to the words of Jesus to Nicodemus in John 3, "If I have told you about earthly things and you do not believe, how can you believe if I tell you about heavenly things?"

There seems to be no end of slightly smug, arrogant, people who, not simply thoughtlessly but brainlessly, critique and dismiss matter of God and of faith. They create their own version of Christian faith, of the Church, of Christian practice, solely for the purpose of pointing out how silly it is and then knocking it down. A good example in this last week has been the press reports following on from General Synod saying the Church of England was to stop referring to God as 'he'. This is presented on one side as being achingly 'woke' and on the other as being an example of the archaic nature of the Church that we would use that pronoun in the first place. In fact, there was no such discussion at Synod and these questions have been around within the Church for millennia and were referenced by St. Paul himself in Galatians 3, "there is no longer male and female; for all of you are one in Christ Jesus."

In this time of Lent I am making a determined effort to avoid standing of the shifting sands of public opinion and looking instead to God "my rock and my salvation" (Psalm 62) the one in whom I can fully trust and believe in all things both earthly and heavenly.

The 2007 musical starring Johnny Depp and Helen Bonham Carter as the Demon Barber and his pie-loving partner in crime.




Wednesday 22nd March 'Taken'

Kneelers

The PCC recently received a request regarding the kneelers, or hassocks, which has been stitched by congregation members in the past. There was once a very enthusiastic group of ladies who produced them although that began to wane some years ago.

The hand made hassocks cover many rich and varied themes and it was suggested that these could be displayed more, rather than simply being pushed under the pews as is currently the case. Those of you who come on a Sunday will have seen that, for the last few weeks, some of the hassocks have been placed at the altar rail. I think it is fair to say that



this hasn't been a complete success as the mix of colours is aesthetically challenging and it can make it difficult to kneel, particularly if you get caught between two of them.

We won't be continuing with this experiment however we would like, if possible, to display them more. We are not attracted to the idea of screwing lots of screws or hooks into the pews, for both aesthetic and health and safety reasons, but if you have any ideas please speak to lan or the Churchwardens. General Synod: Living in Love & Faith

A Note from Bishop Mark

General Synod met recently and, among other things, discussed LLF. You will probably have seen some headlines about Synod: sadly many of these do not seem accurately to reflect the tone or the content of what took place.

I note that fear and misinformation can be dangerous, and I do need to address it with some specific examples from Synod. There are various things that simply did not happen at Synod, whatever social media might be saying.

• We did not vote to change the doctrine of marriage

In fact, there was an explicit amendment proposed and welcomed which made this even clearer than it was in the House of Bishops' original papers.

• We did not discuss gender neutral terms for God

There was a question asked which touched on this and a very brief reply was given by the Chair of the Liturgical Commission but this was not discussed at all by Synod

• The bishops did not control the debate or the voting on LLF

Every vote was 'by houses' at the request either of a member of the House of Laity or the House of Clergy. In each vote the bishops voted individually, and in every case with either one or both of the other two houses (in other words, the bishops' votes were in line with Synod). Bishops spoke for and against the motion and most amendments.

Please take time to make sure you are hearing what has actually been discussed and decided and not simply reacting to second or third-hand information. In truth, there was a respectful, honest, and raw debate where views were expressed honestly and often painfully.
