

Dear Friends,

Lent is once more upon us and we hope and pray that, for the first time since 2019, we shall be able to follow our full and normal programme. You will find about what we are doing in the pages of this magazine however the thing I want to draw your attention to is the Living in Love and Faith Course (LLF) that we are encouraging all our church members to attend, and yes, that means you, who doesn't think it is the kind of thing for you and doesn't normally attend any courses.

LLF is the most important, and potentially far-reaching, discussion to take place within the Church of England for 30 years and deals with issues of human identity, sexuality and marriage. This discussion will shape the Church of England for many years to come and so it is important that you should participate, and your voice be heard.

The Church of England is keenly aware that issues of gender and sexuality are intrinsic to people's experience; their sense of identity; their lives and the loving relationships that shape and sustain them. We also know that the life and mission of our Church – and of the worldwide Anglican Communion – are affected by the deep, and sometimes painful, disagreements among us which have been debated and discussed on many occasions over the years.

These divisions have come into sharper focus because of society's changing perspectives and practices, especially in relation to lesbian, gay, transgender, bisexual and intersex people. The Church wants to understand what it means to follow Christ in love and faith given the questions about human identity and the variety of patterns of relationship emerging in our society, including marriage, civil partnership, cohabitation, celibacy and friendship.

LLF sets out a framework upon which our discussions can take place based upon 6 pastoral principles that all participants are asked to bear in mind. These principles are acknowledge prejudice, speak into silence, address ignorance, cast our fear, admit hypocrisy and pay attention to power (as in look to where power resides). These principles underlie our discussion as we seek to explore together where God is leading us in our every changing and ever more complex world. You still have time to sign up to one of our courses which begin on Thursday 3 March and run for 5 weeks.

# **Ash Wednesday**

Ash Wednesday is the first day of Lent, the period of preparation before our celebration of Easter that reflects the 40 days that Jesus spent fasting in the wilderness in preparation for the start of his public ministry.

Throughout Lent there are particular days that have their own special flavour' and Ash Wednesday is one such day. In the bible ashes were often used a sign of penitence, a recognition of our mortality as reflected in the words used at the Ash Wednesday service, "Remember that you are dust and to dust you shall return". This is, however, set against the saving grace of God in whom we find eternal life through Jesus Christ. Jesus overcame death and opened the kingdom of Heaven to all believers.

But to walk in the footsteps requires discipline, which is what Lent is all about, teaching ourselves discipline and self-control. Join us as we begin our Lenten journey, as we remind ourselves that we are indeed but dust but also that, in Christ, we are made little more than angels.

# **Mothering Sunday**

It isn't often that Ash Wednesday and Mothering Sunday fall in the same month, but such is the case this year.

Despite bold claims to the contrary, it isn't totally clear how the tradition came about. The two earliest references to it are both from the 17th century and both occur in the Southwest of England suggesting it was a local Westcountry custom. It may have been associated with servants in country houses going home before Easter although the fact that it was so localised, and only seemed to have involved girls, put a question mark against that (it also begs the question, why wasn't there a similar day a few weeks before Christmas?).

It was however deemed to be a 'good thing' especially as families became more and more dispersed. The linking of the word 'mother' to their 'mother church' seems a later addition but is was certainly the Church that both popularised and sustained it throughout the centuries, bolstered in the 20<sup>th</sup> century by the importation of the American Mother's Day. Mothering Sunday continues as a day of thanksgiving amidst the sombreness of Lent as we celebrate the gift of love within our families.

# Living in Love & Faith

Starting on the 3<sup>rd</sup> March we shall be holding two Living in Love & Faith courses. Living in Love and Faith addresses some of the most important questions facing the Church and our society today, questions of sexuality, gender, relationships and marriage. Within the Church specifically it raises questions about our understanding of scripture, the Church's role within society, the shape of licensed ministry (both ordained and lay) and the welcome we extend to others.

In other words, Living in Love and Faith is likely to be the most important discussion that will take place within the Church of England for the next 30 years and you really need to be involved.

Living in Love and Faith is our opportunity to educate ourselves as to the issues, listen to what the Bible has to say, hear the first-hand testimonies of those who have experience in these matters, and last - but not least - discuss and pray over these questions with fellow Christians.

There are two courses you can choose between, a virtual course via Zoom and a face-to-face course. The Zoom course will also include people from around the Deanery and my advice, if at all possible, is to attend the face-to face course. We will provide you with a booklet so please let us know if you are attending the course.

# The Two Ways

The Didache (Teaching) is an ancient Christian catechism written in Common (Koine) Greek and dating from around the late 1st century to the mid-2nd century. It was written for Jewish converts and is one of the most important early insights into the life of the Church outside of the New Testament. What is remarkable is how many passages from the gospels, particularly Matthew's, were known so well that, not only did the (anonymous) writer know them but it his clear assumption that his audience knew them also. It has four sections, Ethics, Rituals, Church Order and a final Eschatological section, but, at the start of Lent, here is the very first section dealing with the first of the two commandments.

There are two ways, one of life and one of death; but a great difference

between the two ways.

The way of life, then, is this: First, you shall love God who made you; second, your neighbour as yourself; and all things whatsoever you would should not occur to you, do not also do to another. And of these sayings the teaching is this:



Bless those who curse you, and pray for your enemies, and fast for those who persecute you. For what reward is there, if you love those who love you? Do not also the Gentiles do the same? But love those who hate you, and you shall not have an enemy.

Abstain from fleshly and worldly lusts. If someone gives you a blow upon your right cheek, turn to him the other also, and you shall be perfect. If someone impresses you for one mile, go with him two. If someone takes away your cloak, give him also your coat. If someone takes from you what is yours, ask it not back, for indeed you are not able. Give to every one that asks you, and ask it not back; for the Father wills that to all should be given of our own blessings (free gifts). Happy is he that gives according to the commandment; for he is guiltless.

Woe to him that receives; for if one having need receives, he is guiltless; but he that receives not having need, shall pay the penalty, why he received and for what, and, coming into straits (confinement), he shall be examined concerning the things which he has done, and he shall not escape thence until he pay back the last farthing.

But also now concerning this, it has been said, Let your alms sweat in your hands, until you know to whom you should give.
