

Dear Friends,

June is always, to me at least, a time when we can slow down and draw breath a little. The Church's year is massively lopsided with most everything happening in the period between November to May, All Saints, All Souls, Remembrance Sunday, Advent, Christmas, Epiphany, Ash Wednesday, Lent, Easter, Pentecost and All Saints. From the start of June we have... err... the Mobberley Rose Queen Festival!?!

In a strange way this kind of mirrors the agricultural year, winter and spring being a time of preparation, of feeding and tending but whereas in the farming year this then leads into a flurry of activity with harvesting we continue with a degree of peace and quiet. Peace and quiet however are not the same as idleness.

Peace, true peace, is not simply the absence of a thing, whether that thing be work or war, but rather peace is about the presence of something, and that something is harmony. True peace is about things working together, creating something afresh. Think of a large orchestra, there are violinists elbows see-sawing, kettle-drummers tub-thumping away, trombonist huffing and puffing and everyone else in between. They are anything but peaceful, but they are working together in harmony, they are at peace with one another within and through all their frantic activity.

In the same way, quiet is not simply the a lack of noise. Quiet is about acceptance and contentedness, quiet is the peace that lies within ourselves. Rather than between others. Going back to orchestras, quietness is what was to be found in the band that continued to play as the Titanic sank, it was what lay in the heart of Captain Oates when he told his team he was nipping out and might be some time.

Following on from the busyness of the last 6-7 months we now have the chance of a bit of peace and quiet. A bit of time to seek and develop peace and harmony between our family, friends and neighbours, growing God's kingdom of justice and peace. It is also the time to seek out God in our own lives and our own hearts. To listen for his voice, to discern his will and to do it, finding within obedience the reality of Jesus' promise in Matthew 11, "Come to me, all you that are weary and are carrying heavy burdens, and I will give you rest."

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Alternative Services

Our second alternative service takes place at The Beacon on Wednesday 7th June at 7.00 p.m. This service may not seem that alternative as it is a service of Compline, however it has been slightly adapted to fit into the more reflective style that we are wanting to achieve with these services.

Compline is a service, called an 'Office' which along with others such as matins, vespers, evensong, set the pattern of worship within religious communities. Compline was the last Office of the day and the name comes from the Latin for



'completion', a theme picked up in the Compline hymn, "Before the ending of the day, creator of the world, we pray, that with thy wonted favour thou wouldst be our guard and keeper now". By its nature therefore it is a service that gives us space to think on the day past, to reflect on what has been done and to prepare ourselves for the day ahead.

We shall be keeping some of the music that you might be familiar with if you attend the services during Lent but this is an opportunity to sit, listen and think.

Church Cleaning & Maintenance

We weren't able to hold our annual church Spring Clean this year however it has not been forgotten and we have set aside the date of **Saturday 1st July from 10.00 a.m.** On this day we shall be cleaning, dusting, and polishing the interior whilst also weeding, oiling, getter and drain clearing the exterior. Covid & Communion

Practices within the Church of England are governed by Canon Law and also what are known as its 'historic formularies' which are the Book of Common Prayer and the Thirty Nine Articles of Religion. In all of these documents it is clear in the Church of England the normal way to receive the wine at Holy Communion is via a common cup or where there are large numbers present a number of common cups.

There have been exceptions to this and in 1969 the C of E issued guidelines which permitted 'intinction' for reasons of health, this involves dipping the bread in the wine so both bread and wine are received together. This is what we have been doing at St. Wilfrid's for the last couple of years despite the fact that a year or so ago the

Church of England covid guidelines permitted a return to sharing a common cup. We took the decision to delay because the previous winter had seen an upsurge in cases due to the omicron variant of the Covid-19 strain.



Over the last few years there has been increased research into both Covid-19 and the risks of sharing the common cup. and that research has essentially come to the same conclusion, a conclusion that is summed up in the conclusion of a report undertaken by Cambridge University which states,

It must therefore be admitted that the common communion cup may serve as a means of transmitting infection. Reasons are given, however, for believing that the risk of transmission is very small, and probably much smaller than that of contracting infection by other methods in any gathering of people.

The church does not close, only the building. Because we are the church, the living body of our Lord Jesus and we are everywhere.

At the same time incidences of Covid in our area is tiny. We share a statistical area with Plumley and High Legh and in the 7 days leading to the 6th May no figures were available, which meant there were less than 3 cases per 100,000 people.

Meanwhile, the World Health Organisation has recognised that Covid-19 is now an

established and ongoing health issue and no longer constitutes a public health emergency. In other words Covid is here to stay. This may be reflected in UK death rates which in March 2023 showed Covid to be responsible for 32 deaths per 100,000 people which is a long way behind flu and pneumonia at around 45 deaths per 100,000.

In summary therefore, Covid is present in the population and always will be. At the same time, Covid rates in our area are very low (too low to register) and research indicates that you are as likely to catch Covid at a Family Service as you are at a Communion service.

In light of this at the meeting of the PCC on the 22nd May 2023 it was agreed that we should return to the use of a common cup at communion services. Please note this won't happen immediately as we need to recruit and train/retrain our communion assistants.

In the meantime here are the answers to some FAQs -

Shouldn't we wait a bit longer?

What would we be waiting for? Covid isn't ever going to go away, the number of Covid cases registered locally cannot get any lower, current scientific research uniformly suggests that it is safe to return to using the common cup and we have waited a year already.


Couldn't we use both a common cup and intinction?

Yes and no. Whilst in theory we could there is no reasonable way that we can think of which would be easy for the congregation to grasp, easy for the President to administer and which would be hygienic for all.

I still feel unsure, is it alright to just receive the bread?

Christian theology holds that the body of Christ is indivisible, in receiving either the bread or the wine, we are in full communion with Christ. There is no problem in receiving just the bread, as we did for a year between 2020 and 2021, this is also the permanent practice of the Roman Catholic church.


Wednesday Matinees
