

The Rector Writes

Dear Friends,

September turned out to be a momentous month as we laid to rest our beloved Queen of 70 years. It is a length of reign that is all but unimaginable, 80% of the UK population have never known another monarch and have therefore never sung anything other than 'God save the Queen', a line very few alive today may ever sing again. The Queen's death came very suddenly an I would like to thank a number of people in our church community for their swift action, particularly or Flag Captain Mike Boalch and Ray Britland and all the bellringers for making sense of the, at times confusing, guidelines and protocols.

We must not forget that just two days before her death she appointed our new Prime Minister, Liz Truss. There can be few cases of a new, peacetime, Prime Minister facing such an enormous and difficult 'in-tray' with the ongoing Covid pandemic, war raging in Europe, the fuel and cost of living crisis and the death of the Queen all to be dealt with, on top of all the usual affairs of state. Regardless of political affiliation we must remember that our new Prime Minister is still a human being and I would commend her and all her cabinet to your prayers. Never has the, supposed, Chinese curse, 'May you live in interesting times' been more appropriate.

Over the last couple of weeks one of the words that has frequently been used to describe gueen Elizabeth is 'steadfast' and that she certainly was, steadfast, resolute, faithful, and I can't help thinking that this was because of her faith in God. The Queen was never shy of speaking of God and of Jesus, in her 2014 Christmas message she said, ""For me, the life of Jesus Christ, the Prince of Peace, whose birth we celebrate today, is an inspiration and an anchor in my life. A role model of reconciliation and forgiveness, he stretched out his hands in love, acceptance and healing. Christ's example has taught me to seek to respect and value all people of whatever faith or none." I don't think it is an accident that people found and appreciated in her the very things that she found and appreciated in Christ for that is, in so many ways, the model of the Christian life. So often we are told to imitate Christ so that, in the words of Jesus in Matthew 5:16, "let your light shine before others, so that they may see your good works and give glory to your Father in heaven." We give thanks for the faithful example of the Queen and pray that she may rest in peace and rise in glory.

Celebrating St. Wilfrid




We celebrate our Patronal Festival, the feast of our patron saint, Wilfrid, on Sunday the 9th October. St. Wilfrid was one of the most important people in the life of the early Church in England. Although brought up in what we now refer to as the Celtic tradition, which was centred around monasteries, Abbots and local chapels, Wilfrid came to fully embrace the Catholic model of the Church, founded on Dioceses, Bishops and parish churches.

Wilfrid was a great evangelist and church builder. His run-ins with the beloved St. Chad somewhat soured his reputation in the north of England but in the south he is very much loved and revered, as he should be all over. St. Bede wrote that a 3-year drought in Sussex was ended when Wilfrid arrived and started his ministry. We mark the Feast of St. Wilfrid at our All-Age Service at 10.00 a.m.

PCC Away Day

The PCC held it's Away Day on the 10th September at which we discussed a wide range of topics from what is the purpose of the Church through our service patterns, outreach and even our current Covid restrictions.

The first part of our meeting was about drawing up a Mission Statement against which we could then measure the various things we do. This wasn't easy to do in the context of one session and we were anxious to avoid ending up with 'a horse designed by committee' but we did come to a number of core values that we could apply when we came on to the next part of the meeting.

The second session was to look at the various things we do now and try and place them into one of three categories - worship, mission and ministry. We recognised these all overlapped in places and it was possible to place things in more than one category. What became very clear is that the majority of what we do falls into worship and that ministry and more particularly mission is limited.

In our final session we looked what we could do to help redress the balance, testing our ideas against the (rough) mission statement. We came up with lots of ideas that we will be working through over the coming months and you will be hearing about them.

• Change to Covid Restrictions

In our final session we spent some time addressing our Covid Restrictions. It was proposed that from the **2nd October we shall do away with the current one-way system and return to receiving Communion from the altar rail**. We won't yet be returning to receiving from the common cup and our current system of intinction will be retained, this will also reduce the time you will be in close contact with others. This proposal was passed at the PCC meeting on the 20th September. We continue to ask people to keep a sensible distance and avoid crowding each other.

Farewell to Rev. Caroline

It was back in 2012 that I was preparing for my sabbatical I first came across Caroline. The dear departed Rev. Terry Etheridge was



positioned to be the regular clergy stand-in until he dropped the terrible news that he had been diagnosed with terminal cancer and, indeed, he died within 3-4 months of that diagnosis. I was scrambling to find clergy to stand in and it was then I first came across the Rev. Caroline Holmes.

From the very outset Caroline was a brick, immediately agreeing to take on virtually all the 8.30 services and that was the start of a great working relationship. Caroline has been

my go-to person for the last decade every time I have been away meaning she has worked closely with, first, Michelle and more recently John. She has always gone above and beyond to help, she always really loved coming to Mobberley and Mobberley loved her in return.

Over the years her health, and more particularly her mobility, has been in decline she was finding it an ever greater struggle to mange steps and to stay stood for long periods and, following the pandemic, she took the decision to relocate to Ripon to be nearer her daughter.

This is sad news for us as I have lost a really wonderful support and Mobberley church has lost a lovely priest. We took the opportunity to say goodbye to Caroline properly at a special farewell on the 18th September. She was presented with a beautiful Peace Lily and a voucher to spend on anything she might need for her new home (or herself, of course). She was also presented with a beautiful cake, baked by Jo-Ann, which was shared after the service. Thank you Caroline for all you have given Mobberley Church and we wish you peace and joy in your retirement.
